Fifty years ago, Aretha Franklin dropped her smash hit Respect and the world was never the same.

In March, at Auckland Arts Festival 2017, four of New Zealand's most powerful Queens of Soul, Aaradhna, Annie Crummer, Bella Kalolo and Esther Stephens, pay respect to Aretha's call-to-action in a world premiere event that spans genre and generations.

An anthem that spurred change, *Respect* was a Grammy Award-winning protest song and landmark for the feminist generation. Following the sell-out success of *Lady Sings the Blues* and *Dust to Dusky*, this Auckland Arts Festival production and spectacular Spiegeltent performance promises to be as potent as it would have been in 1967.

Multi-award-winning singer-songwriter Aaradhna made headlines with her latest album, *Brown Girl*, which was written in direct response to the racist abuse she suffered growing up in New Zealand. In an open letter she wrote to her fans on release of the album, she said, "Growing up as an Indian and Samoan New Zealander, I've seen and witnessed others including myself being automatically 'labelled' for what we look like, what we wore, the way we spoke, where we resided... I feel confident in what I do and am ready for anything that comes my way."

Annie Crummer's immense talent, ongoing contemporary relevance, heartfelt honesty and worldwide popularity haven't faltered in her 25+ years in the business; from the earliest days when, as a 19-year-old, her backing vocals on The Netherworld Dancing Toys' hit *For Today* made her a household name in New Zealand, to today, when she is still considered one of New Zealand's very best female artists.

Bella Kalolo is a passionate, vibrant and commanding New Zealand soul singer who has performed with the likes of Fat Freddy's Drop, Dave Dobbyn, Hollie Smith and Don McLashlan, among many others. She was awarded Best Female at the 2012 Pacific Music Awards and has performed at the renowned Glastonbury Festival.

Esther Stephens has not only proved herself as a powerful singer able to cross genre and eras with ease, the *Westside* actress has recently come off the back of a hugely popular season playing New Zealand's most famous feminist, Kate Sheppard, in the Auckland Theatre Company production of *That Bloody Woman*.

Accompanied by Auckland Jazz Orchestra, these iconic New Zealand musicians bring a blend of funk, soul and original R&B, along with a selection of Aretha's classics.
